wants to attend the Army's military police school after basic training and eventually study law. His calm, cool demeanor should serve him well as an MP.

Our residents usually have tough stories as to what brought them to our campus. Sean is no different and his experiences are still fresh and tender. He may not feel comfortable to share them freely but the professionals who have been working with him will attest to his great progress and tremendous potential he now has before him.


Life got real... real fast for Sean when a bad car wreck on Bent Mountain near Roanoke left his dad paralyzed but he and his sister survived with limited injuries.
