

I needed to learn how to feel good about myself.

> When I think over things I would change about my life if I could, I would probably not change anything. The circumstances I have gone through in my life have made me who I am today. I would not have been blessed to meet the wonderful people here who have taught me so much and given me the self-confidence I need to get through life. I look at my past as being God's plan for me to make me the person I am today.

> I ask for your prayers as I start a new chapter in my life. Thank you for giving me a chance to change my life. You do make a difference in the lives of children in need.


