Part of the process we go through T at the beginning of each year is an evaluation of all aspects of our ministry. It is important for us to know that we are making the best use of the funds that our supporters give to us. The trust you place in us to provide our children the best possible chance for success is one we take very seri-

The past two years have brought another variable into our evaluation process. Due to the For Keeps initiative championed by the First Lady of Virginia during the previous administration, residential homes such as ours have fallen into disfavor as an option for children who are victims of abuse and neglect. The push to put children in foster homes regardless of their needs and the financial penalties placed on localities that place children with us have made it more difficult to serve the children that need us. In turn, this has affected the funding balance between the monies we receive from the localities and the gifts from our donors. To give you an example, in 2006 our beds were filled at a 92.5% capacity; in 2009, that number dropped to 64.8%. I can assure you that it is not because there are fewer children needing our help.

What are we doing about it? On the legislative front, we are working diligently with our elected officials to return children's homes to the equal footing we need both financially and legislatively that will allow us to continue to serve abused and neglected children. Here on campus we have re-
